Air Guard gets first KC-135R

The first of five KC-135R Stratotankers to become part of the Hawaii Air National Guard's (HIANG) newest squadron arrived at Hickam Air Force Base (AFB), Dec. 4. The refueling aircraft will be flown and maintained by the 203rd Air Refueling Squadron (ARS), which will be activated Feb. 12.

Originally from Castle AFB in California, the KC-135R was flown to Hickam by Lt. Col. James M. Hussey, and his crew: Capt. Stephen L. Su'a-Filo, pilot; Maj. Edwin A. Vincent Jr., navigator; Tech. Sgt. Stephen V. Cid, boom operator; and maintenance crew members, Master Sgt. Vincent J. Ramos and Staff Sgt. Michael J. McGann.

With a Hawaiian flag waving from the cockpit, the refueling aircraft taxied in before a cheering crowd of family and HIANG members. As it rolled to a stop, Chief Master Sgt. Jack W. Uhrig, production control superintendent, gave an enthusiastic thumbs up sign to the crew -- mission accom-

They were greeted by Maj. Gen. Edward V. Richardson, the adjutant general, Brig. Gen. Allen M. Mizumoto, HIANG commander, and Lt. Col. Walter K. Kaneakua Jr., 203rd ARS commander, before being presented flower leis by the welcoming crowd.

The 203rd ARS will be the only KC-135 refueling unit stationed in Hawaii. The squadron will be staffed by 112 full-time and 81 drill-status members. The 203rd is scheduled to receive another aircraft in January, two more in April and the last in May 1993.

The tankers will provide intheater air-to-air refueling resources for the U.S. Pacific Air Forces. In addition to refueling, the Stratotanker is capable of car-

rying up to 83,000 pounds of cargo and/or 60 personnel.

The KC-135R is a derivative of the Boeing 707. The aircraft was re-engined with a CFM 56 engine, giving it increased thrust and takeoff gross weight, an increased radius of operation, and a shorter takeoff distance. Other extensive modifications include stronger landing gear, a re-skinned aircraft surface, greater fuel efficiency, and a decreased noise footprint.

Capt. Su'a-filo, a Kahuku High School graduate, commented, "This is only the first of many to come. I am sure nothing but success will come out of this squad-

As we approach the close of 1992, I want to thank all of you and your families for the outstanding contributions you have made to our department. As all of you know, we have met a number of challenges in the past 12 months, making this a year of extraordinary requirements and unsurpassed achievements.

We concluded 1991 by participating in the Dec. 5-7 commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor and the Dec. 14 flood in Anahola, Kauai. We then embarked on what will no doubt be a landmark year in our department's history.

We began 1992 by helping load and transport 46,000 pounds of relief goods to Samoa following Cyclone Val. We assisted the Employers Support for the Guard and Reserve (ESGR) on a number of joint Hawaii Army and Air National Guard projects, including the "Bosslift" to Alaska this summer. In September, we carried out our department's greatest peacetime mission by spearheading the emergency response, relief and recovery efforts triggered by Hurricane Iniki. These, however, were only the highlights of a remarkable year as each division in our department has compiled a long list of accomplishments.

The Hawaii Air National Guard started the year by converting its F-15s under the multi-stage improvement program (MSIP); deployed airmen for training in Thailand, Alaska, Japan and the mainland; earned three safety awards and an Air Force Organizational Excellence Award; and received its first KC-135R Stratotanker aircraft Dec. 4.

The Hawaii Army National Guard deployed soldiers to Japan, Australia and Alaska throughout the year; received its new C-26B Fairchild fixed-wing aircraft, setting a new trans-Pacific speed record in the process; conducted junior leadership training on all major islands; and completed a successful annual training with specific emphasis on squad-level tactics.

State Civil Defense (SCD) conducted Tsunami and other civil defense training throughout the state. Prior to Hurricane Iniki making landfall, the entire SCD staff worked around-the-clock and did an outstanding job monitoring and dealing with the emergency. Their work, far from being completed, will involve years of mitigation

actions and auditing records.

The Office of Veterans Services (OVS), meanwhile, dedicated the Hawaii State Veterans Cemetery in Kaneohe in July, and the State Commission on Memorials for Veterans of the Korean and Vietnam Conflicts selected a design for the Korean-Vietnam Memorial in October. OVS also began publishing its quarterly newsletter, The Hawaii Veteran in July and expanded distribution to more than 4,500 veterans by the end of the year. OVS also made notable progress by developing a new data bank to better serve veterans and obtaining the funds to improve veterans cemeteries on the neighbor islands.

As you can see, this has been a truly incredible year. Each day, our employees, along with the support of their families, accomplished their day-to-day requirements and met each emergency mission with incredible speed, competence and professionalism. If anything, our people's ability to take on these extremely difficult assignments with a positive "can-do" attitude is what has and will continue to set the standard for all future members of our department.

On Dec. 18-20, the 111th Army Band presented its annual Christmas Concert for the State Department of Defense on Kauai and Oahu. The band performed with its characteristic flair, showcasing their versatility and talent. The band's two performances on Kauai, Dec. 18 and 19, were emotionally uplifting for our members, families and friends who have had more

than their share of loss and suffering this year.

The concert on Oahu was emotionally moving on a different level as the 111th Army Band "family" recognized two of their own: 1st Sgt. Bill Yuen, who retired in 1988, and 1st Sgt. Ron Bright, who retires next year. The band members' gestures of support and appreciation are characteristic of the Hawaii National Guard, which is basically a close-knit family with people who sincerely care for one another.

On Jan. 2, more than 700 state DOD members will sail to Kauai aboard the luxury cruise liner, S.S. Constitution. Governor John Waihee and the Department of Business, Economic Development and Tourism, in coordination with American Hawaii Cruise Lines, arranged the four-day voyage to honor our department's efforts during Operation Iniki.

Governor Waihee is especially grateful for the outstanding job you did for the residents of Kauai.

The senior leaders of our department also feel the trip to Kauai is an excellent opportunity to honor and thank our people for their unselfish efforts. There will be a short ceremony at the Kukui Grove Pavilion on Kauai, Jan. 4, to thank our soldiers, airmen and civilian employees for a job well done.

Another reason for the trip is to show our people how far the Kauai community has come on their long road to recovery. Tourism has made a remarkable comeback there and our department has been invited as

the first group to travel to the island prior to the resumption of regularly scheduled cruise service, Jan. 11, and a grand re-opening of Kauai's hotels, May 1.

We realize that everyone who participated in Operation Iniki may not be able to take advantage of this rare opportunity. This was a last-minute offer and most of you had set plans for the holidays. Our division heads and staff did their best to contact as many people as possible and handled the selection process in the most equitable way possible. For those of you who were chosen by your supervisory or command chain, I want to wish you a very pleasant cruise. You deserve it.

Again, I want to express my appreciation to all of the soldiers, airmen, civilian employees, families and retirees of the State Department of Defense. Each of you has done an exceptional job for the department throughout the year, and I am extremely proud of your outstanding performance. Your achievements have been highly visible in our communities as well as on the state and national levels. On behalf of Governor Waihee, I thank all of you for your hard work on our road to total quality.

My wife, Celia, joins me in wishing you and yours a joyous and happy holiday season. As we meet the challenges of the new year, let us reflect on our many successes and continue our tradition of serving our nation and state with honor and distinction. Have a Merry Christmas and a safe and prosperous new year!

Survivor Benefit Plan Open Season

Open season for the Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) continues until Mar. 31. During open season you may enroll in SBP, increase the base amount your eligible dependents can receive or electanew SBP supplement. If you are an Army retiree with 20 years of service or have 20 years of service and are eligible for retirement at age 60, you are eligible for the SBP. The cost of changes to your SBP will vary based on several factors: the total number of retirement points; the approximate point value; the type of coverage; and the age of the member and eligible dependents. Commissary cards

Commissaryprivilegecards for 1993 were distributed to Hawaii Air National Guard members in December. The Hawaii Army National Guard is in the process of distributing the recently received 1993 commissary cards.

Increased insurance coverage available

The Veteran's Benefit Act of 1992 makes an additional \$100,000 of coverage available under the Servicemen's Group Life Insurance (SGLI). Service members may now elect insurance coverage in \$10,000 increments up to a maximum of \$200,000. The cost of the additional insurance is 80 cents per month for each \$10,000 of coverage. To participate in this program, the service member must submit a completed copy of the November 1992 version of the SGLI 8286 form to his or her commander. This new form is available at unit orderly rooms. Applications submitted after March 31, will require a statement of health.

GI Bill increase

Effective April 1, 1993,

monthly basic educational assistance rates under the Montgomery GI Bill will increase to \$400 for full-time participants who serve three years or more on active duty; \$325 for those who serve two years of active duty; and \$190 for full-time participants in the Montgomery GI Bill-Selected Reserve program.

"Composite" out

Headquarters, U.S. Air Force has directed that "composite" is no longer valid in reference to "composite groups." The new designation will be simply "group," as in "154th Group."

Service dress hats no longer issued

Flight caps are now standard headgear for Air Force members. Service dress hats, as of Oct. 1, are no longer issued to new recruits. The change reduces the enlisted clothing allowance. Although dress hats and caps are not mandatory, they may still be worn, as may the beret.

New DIC schedule

The current Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (DIC) schedule of benefits based on military rank has been changed to a monthly base rate of \$750, effective Jan. 1, 1993. The change reduces survivors' benefits for E7s and above. The loss may be offset by the SBP or increased SGLI coverage.

Pearl Harbor remembered

At 7:56 a.m., Dec. 7, 1992, four F-15 fighters from the Hawaii Air National Guard's 199th Fighter Squadron swept over the final resting place of the USS Arizona, which sank Dec. 7, 1941 during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

The 'missing man' flyover ended a moment of silence observed throughout the Pearl Harbor Naval complex at 7:55 a.m. to mark the exact moment of the Japanese attack. The observance was part of ceremonies held at the USS Arizona Memorial Visitor Center and on the USS Arizona Memorial to commemorate the 51st anniversary of the attack.

The Arizona Memorial ceremony, which was attended by Gov. John Waihee as well as Pearl Harbor survivors, veterans representatives and other invited guests, included a commemorative address by Admiral Robert J. Kelly, commander in chief. U.S. Pacific Fleet, wreath presentations by the military and veterans organizations, a U.S. Marine Corps 21-gun salute, and echo taps performed by Pacific Fleet Band buglers. The ceremony was sponsored by the U.S. Navy.

In a concurrent ceremony held at the Visitor Center by the National Park Service (NPS), the invocation and keynote address were given by Pearl Harbor survivors, Chaplain Joseph Morgan and Samuel Bishop, respectively.

The Office of Veterans Services (OVS) welcomes new Filipino veterans service coordinator, Mila Medallon. As a veterans service coordinator, Mila assists Filipino veterans applying for naturalization. She specializes in unique and difficult cases referred to her by four immigration centers. Since Mila started in October, she has handled more than 20 cases.

The job also includes assisting Filipino veterans with Department of Human Services forms. At a temporary shelter for Filipino vets, she meets with other service agencies to provide help such as food, clothing, housing and jobs. Mila is working on a report for the state legislature on Filipino vets and developing brochures to inform the veterans of available programs and services.

"I was always a social worker, recalls Mila," When I was a child, I used to steal meat from my mother's pantry. I hid the meat in packages then rode to the poor area of town on my bike and distributed the meat to the people. I was nicknamed Karne which means 'meat' in Filipino. Mom never found out until years later when she came to America."

Mila received a B.A. from the University of the Phillipines in 1966 and came to Hawaii two years later. In 1977, she received another B.A., in Psychology, from West Oahu College, and in 1979,

a Masters of Social Work from the University of Hawaii.

Mila worked as a social worker for the elderly at the Catholic Social Services Center from 1984 to 1985 and at Straub Hospital from 1985 to 1987. She then worked for five years at the State Department of Labor, Office of Community Service, as the immigrant service director, where she was the 1992 Department of Labor Industrial Relations Employee of the

Mila and her husband, Nune, have one son, Rod. In her spare time Mila writes poetry and composes songs. She is also the editor for the Fil-Am newspaper.

One of Mila's goals for the future is a Ph.D. "I want to be productive and not take up space. When I come home at night, I get a warm and fuzzy feeling after helping improve people's lives."

Calendar year 1992 was another good year for the Hawaii Army National Guard (HIARNG). We started the year determined to accomplish two clear goals: have a successful annual training; and pass the Inspector General (IG) inspection with flying colors.

We accomplished the first goal with outstanding performances by all units in the HIARNG during annual training. The junior leader training program developed and executed by the combined efforts of our noncommissioned officers (NCOs), the U. S. Army Readiness Group, and the 25th Infantry Division (Light) proved to be instrumental in developing and refreshing the knowledge and skills of our junior leaders. Our junior NCOs put these skills to very productive use during the rigorous evaluations of annual train-

The squad-level evaluations conducted by the 1st and 2nd Battalions, 299th Infantry, placed stress on every single soldier, as the success or failure of the squads depended not only on the squad leaders or the fire team leaders, but on every member of the squad.

As I have said many times, give our soldiers the conditions, standards, and training, and they can meet any challenge. All of our squads passed their evaluations.

The 1st Battalion, 487th Artillery, took on a battalion-level Army Training Evaluation Test (ARTEP) and "shot the lights out." Their "move, shoot, and communicate" skills were put to the test, and they did exceptionally well. Their "putting steel on target" was especially noteworthy.

All of the other HIARNG units: the 29th Support Battalion; the 1st Battalion, 193rd Aviation; the 297th Supply and Service Battalion; the 111th Army Band; the 117th Public Affairs Detachment; and the Hawaii Military Academy performed in similarly outstanding fashion. Our challenge is to maintain the level of training and performance of 1992, and to continually improve and establish higher levels of performance every year.

Our second goal, to pass the IG re-inspection, was also accomplished during 1992. We had gotten away from the compliancetype of inspections, and had, in many ways, become lax in following fully the requirements in all of our functional areas -- training, logistics, and administration.

As with our annual training, we are not yet where we want to be and must continually strive to improve our performances. We need to build into our work environments the commitment that nothing less than full compliance with all directives will be accepted, and that we will do our work with our customers in mind. Our customers, of course, are our fellow workers, the members of the HIARNG, and our community.

A Drug called alcohol

HIARNG Safety Office

Drinking can be a deadly driving partner. Studies have shown that alcohol is a factor in about half of all driving fatalities. It's a powerful depressant with dangerous side effects and acts like an anesthetic.
