## Neighbor island burial detail takes off

The Hawaii National Guard (HING), in conjunction with the active military and the Office of Veterans Services (OVS), inaugurated its neighbor island burial detail service with a flight to Kauai, April 7.

The burial detail was initiated by Maj. Gen. Edward V. Richardson, state adjutant general, to ensure that veterans of all services who are entitled to military burials receive those honors when requested by their next of kin.

In the past, a lack of funds for air transportation limited the active component support for veterans' burials on the neighbor islands. The new program uses the Hawaii Army National Guard's 15-passenger C-26 aircraft and the Hawaii Air National Guard's 50-passenger C-130 to move active duty troops from Oahu to provide a 21-gun salute and taps for veterans' burials. OVS neighbor island counselors coordinate the services with civilian mortuaries.

The burial services are available Tuesdays through Thursdays, giving priority to Maui on Tuesday, Kauai on Wednesday, and the

Big Island on Thursday.

"The burial detail is an excellent example of the joint Army/Air and OVS operations we are conducting in our department and with the active

military," said Richardson.

Requests for military honor details are made to civilian mortuaries. The civilian mortuaries pass on the requests to the veteran's active service mortu-

ary affairs office. That office then forwards the request to the HING state army aviation office. The process requires four calendar days notice to coordinate the honors.

# Command notes

This month, the 29th Infantry Brigade celebrated the 25th anniversary of its 1968 federal call-up.

At the time, the 29th, which included the Army Reserve's 100th Battalion, had been designated a selected reserve force for nearly two years with 50 percent more training assemblies each year.

Following the Brigade's acti-

vation, more than 1,100 soldiers were sent to Southeast Asia and Korea. By the time the unit reverted to state duty, 20 soldiers, including 11 in combat, had lost their lives while serving on active duty.

The Brigade's call-up was a tough, learning experience for the Hawaii National Guard (HING), and our soldiers served with honor and distinction. Many of them still serve in the HING and, based on their experience, bring a unique and valuable perspective to the preparation for and fulfillment of our federal mission today.

In the wake of Operation Iniki, our most demanding state mission ever, the anniversary of the Brigade's call-up serves as a timely reminder of our primary mission. In a world in which our security challenges are constantly undergoing change, we must be always vigilant in our training and readiness for a federal call to duty.

In the coming months we have an opportunity to prove that we are up to the task. Operational Readiness Evaluations are scheduled throughout this year and into 1994. Company D of the 1st Battalion, 299th Infantry will be the first military unit in Hawaii to undergo this evaluation. I am confident that Company D and the rest of our units will live up to their outstanding reputation and set the standard in these very important exercises.

Recently, the Secretary of Defense lifted the ban on female pilots flying combat missions and opened up many other positions in the military to women. As we all know, the nation's military is undergoing significant change as a result of both budgetary and social pressures. These changes, which I fully support, are intended to enable us to become a more responsive, more efficient and more effective military force.

Opening our ranks to women not only allows equal opportunity but ensures that the most qualified people will fill each position regardless of gender.

In March we began, in conjunction with the active military, a program to provide military honors at burials of veterans on the neighbor islands. Our C-26 and C-130 aircraft are now shuttling active military honor and color guards to the neighbor islands to participate in burials Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

In this time of increasingly tighter budgets, our veterans remain a high priority. This long-overdue burial detail program is a result of careful planning and coordination with the active military and the State Office of Veterans Services and is just one in a series of efforts we are initiating to improve services to the men and women who have so unselfishly and honorably served our country. I

would like to thank the HIARNG and HIANG staffs and the C-26 and C-130 aircrew members for their dedication to this project.

In April, our department showed outstanding support for the Hawaii Food Bank's annual food drive. We collected more than 1,871 pounds of food and \$976, exceeding our goal by more than 300 percent. The Hawaii Food Bank is a very worthy organization, and I am proud of our department's longstanding and whole-hearted backing of its efforts.

In closing, I would like to express my condolences to the family and friends of retired 1st Sgt. Bill Yuen, who passed away last month. 1st Sgt. Yuen was a good friend to many and an outstanding leader. He helped bring us all countless hours of enjoyment during his 40 plus years with the 111th Army Band and leaves us with many fond memories.

### Female aviators permitted to fly combat missions

Secretary of Defense Les Aspin announced April 28 that the U.S. Department of Defense has lifted the ban on female pilots flying combat missions. Under the directive, female pilots could be flying combat aircraft within a year.

The U.S. Marine Corps is the only branch of service that does not have female aviators. The Navy has 184 female pilots, the Air Force 295 and the Army 327.

The Hawaii National Guard currently has two female helicopter pilots. Capt. Tonnie Casey, a UH-1H pilot, is the commander of the Hawaii Army National Guard's 451st Aviation Detachment, and 1st Lt. Laura Jones, also a UH-1H pilot, is in-processing to join the 451st.

Also, Hawaii Air National Guard Staff Sgt. Heidi N. Kunichika is now in flight screening and scheduled to be commissioned in August and begin pilot training in September.

Casey feels the change is a positive step and hopes more women will see aviation as a choice. "The decision should give greater incentive for women to join and learn. Women will have more responsibility."

### HIARNG wins safety award

The Hawaii Army National Guard (HIARNG) was one of 34 states awarded the National Guard Bureau Safety Award of Merit for Fiscal Year 1992. The award cites the HIARNG's 12-month record without a Class A or B ground or aviation accident.

Staff Sgt. Melvin Partido, HIARNG safety specialist, attributes this

safe record to the dedication of all Guard members.

Partido, along with Louis Miranda, occupational safety and health manager, organized safety classes with instructors from the mainland.

"The Guard members who attended did a good job of implementing safety regulations back at their units," said Partido.

Partido and Miranda also published HIARNG Circular 385-1 (ground) or the "Green Book" which details safety tips and emergency procedures.

The HIARNG last received the Bureau's safety award in 1988.

### New recycling program begins

The State of Hawaii Department of Defense has initiated a new paper recycling program. The major types of paper to be recycled are: computer "bar" paper; white paper (i.e. photo copies, letters, memos and laserjet printed paper); colored or mixed paper; and newspaper.

Paper should be sorted and separated from uncollectable items such as magazines, glass, plastic sacks or clips, envelopes, shredded paper, phone books, blueprint paper, cardboard, carbon paper, rubber bands, self-adhesive labels and tape.

Collection boxes have been established at central locations throughout the department. When in doubt about whether a particular item is recyclable, throw it out rather than contaminate a whole container of goods.

and federal employees may arrange to have an amount deducted from their paychecks each month for purchase of U.S. savings bonds.

# Command Sgt. Maj. Hew retires

After more than 44 years of service with the Hawaii National Guard, the "coach" has hung up his hat. State Command Sgt. Maj. Clement Y.F. Hew retired, April 29.

Maui-born Hew enlisted the Hawaii National Guard in 1949, while still a junior at Kaimuki High School. He worked for the City and County of Honolulu's Public Works Division of Engineering for 33 years, until his retirement in 1986.

In 1962, Hew began a 27-year coaching career at Iolani School. He stopped coaching at Iolani when he took on his full-time duties of state command sergeant major in 1989.

"My job," said Hew, "was to provide the enlisted members a voice at higher headquarters, a place to air their ideas, complaints and concerns."

Transferring his coaching skills to the Guard, Hew practiced a "one team" concept to get the most out of his troops.

"Whether working with Army or Air Guard, reserve or active components," Hew told his NCOs, "we should all be working toward a common goal, for the betterment of all."

Hew was scheduled for a quiet retirement last October, but, in the wake of Hurricane Iniki, extended to assist in the recovery efforts.

"I wanted the soldiers to understand why they were on Kauai," said Hew, "We were there to help our brothers and sisters, to help the community."

"I met each unit as they returned from Kauai to their home stations. I asked the soldiers if they

were going home satisfied.

"They said, 'Yes, the humanitarian mission gave us a gratifying feeling -- a mission with purpose.'"

Hew says that the people of the Guard are what he will miss the most in his retirement.

"I won't forget the camaraderie and the friends I've made through my years with the field artillery (1st Battalion, 487th Field Artillery), the brigade (29th Infantry Brigade) and the rest of my National Guard family."

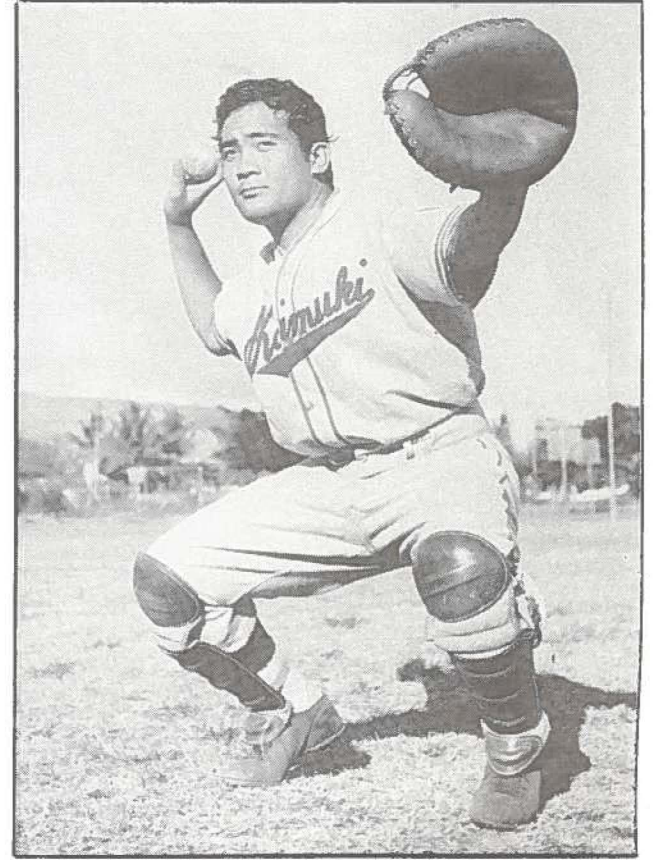
Hew was presented the Legion of Merit and the Meritorious Service Medal by Maj. Gen. Edward V. Richardson, state adjutant general, at an awards ceremony April 21.

His other awards include the Army Commendation Medal, Army Achievement Medal, Armed Forces Reserve Medal, Army Reserve Component Medal, Noncommissioned Officer's Professional Development Ribbon, Army Service Ribbon, Army Reserve Component Overseas Training Ribbon, Hawaii National Guard Medal for Merit, Hawaii National Guard Commendation Medal, and Hawaii National Guard Service Bar with two Kahili devices.

More than 450 people celebrated Hew's retirement at a luau held at Star of the Sea School, April 24.

In parting, Hew thanked General Richardson for his support and concern for the troops, and the well wishers who visited or sent cards during his brief hospital stay in March.

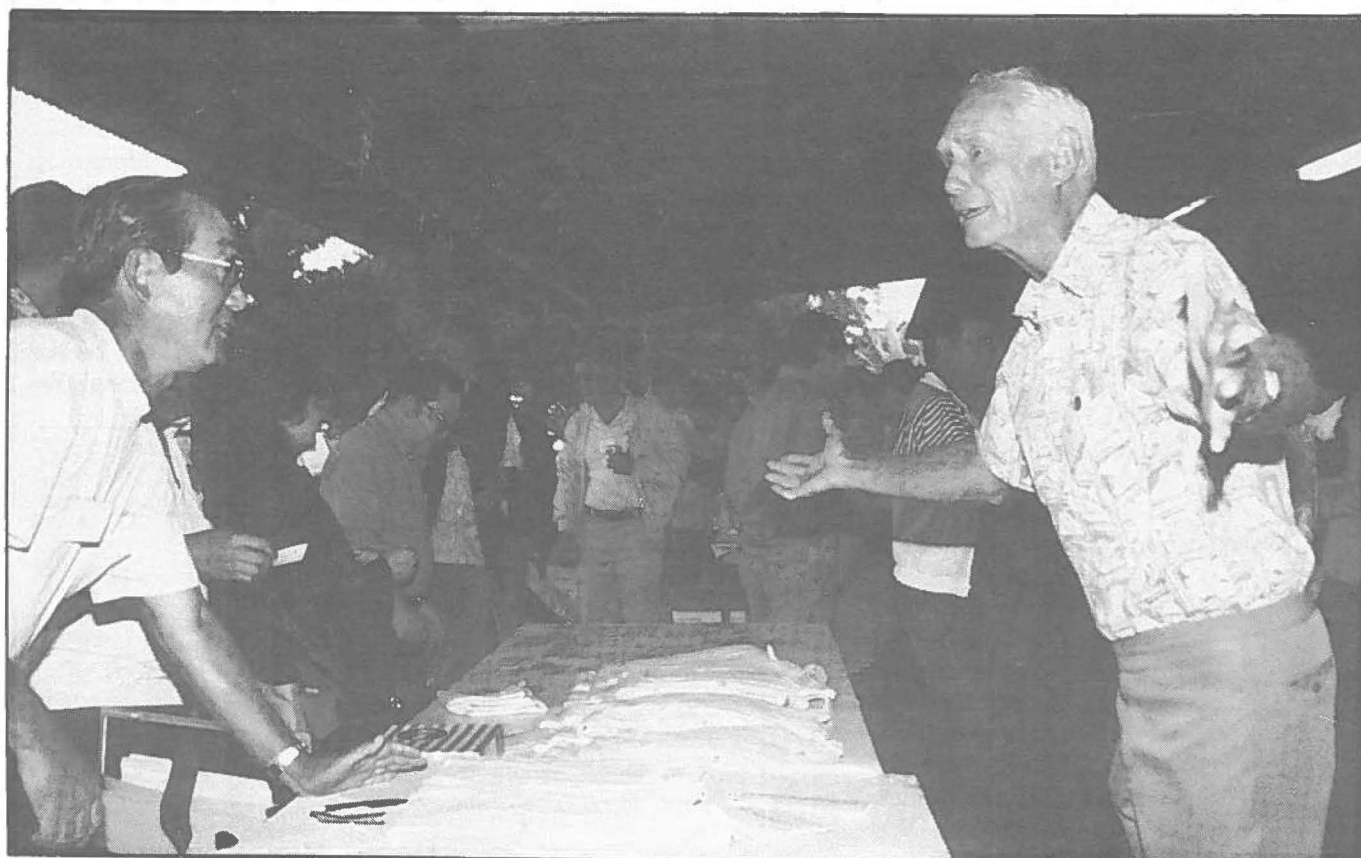

Soldiers from the 29th Infantry Brigade, Hawaii National Guard, activated in 1968 during the conflict, reunited in Hilo for the 25th anniversary call-up, May 15. Also, 12 soldiers assembled at the Vietnam memorial at the Brigade's headquarters in Oahu to salute their fallen comrades, May 13.

More than 260 soldiers, loved ones and guests gathered at Hilo's Wailoa State Park to recall old friendships with fellow comrades and honor those who died during the 1968 call-up.

Maj. Gen. John R. D'Araujo Jr., director of the Hawaii National Guard, was the keynote speaker at the reunion. D'Araujo served nine months in Vietnam as a member of a mobile advisory team, and later as an advisor. "The role of the National Guard has changed since the Vietnam War," he said. "The lessons we learned during the Vietnam War call-up were applied when the reserve was called to support Operation Desert Shield and Storm."

At the reunion, an emotional retired Sgt. M. Y.H. Ko, read the names of the 29 soldiers who died during the Brigade's activation. The Army Reserve's 100th Battalion Infantry (which was assigned to the Brigade's 29th Infantry Brigade's 100th Battalion Infantry), who died during the Brigade's activation.

Earlier in the week, 12 present and former members of the 29th held a quiet ceremony at the Vietnam memorial. Lt. Col. John K. Hao and Sgt. Maj. James M. Reis placed a floral spray on the memorial. They were joined by Maj. Tanouye, Chief Warrant Officers Paul N. Keane and Edgar P. Clark, Master Sgts. Wayne C. George, Q.W. Tom, and Steven P. Young, Sgt. Clifford D. Duro, Staff Sgt. David M. Ogura, a Chief Warrant Officer Maurice A. Souza and Sgt. Maj. Clement Y.F. Hew.

The Department of Defense called 24,500 National Guards members and Army Reservists to federal active duty for the first time in 28 years, April 11, 1968.

Col. Horace S. Hara remembers, "We had to picket lines protesting the Vietnam war to get the Aloha ceremony held at Fort DeRussy before Schofield Barracks, May 13, 1968."

More than 4,120 soldiers from the 29th Infantry Brigade were placed on active duty that day. The soldiers underwent intensive training before tours in Vietnam, on the mainland or at Schofield Barracks. The 29th was not sent as a whole unit. Instead, 1,200 of its members were "levied" as replacements for other units.

D'Araujo, Brigade commander from 1986 to 1991, and Sgt. Maj. James M. Reis, present Brigade command sergeant major, concluded their remarks by reminding the audience to "never forget" those who gave their lives serving in Vietnam.

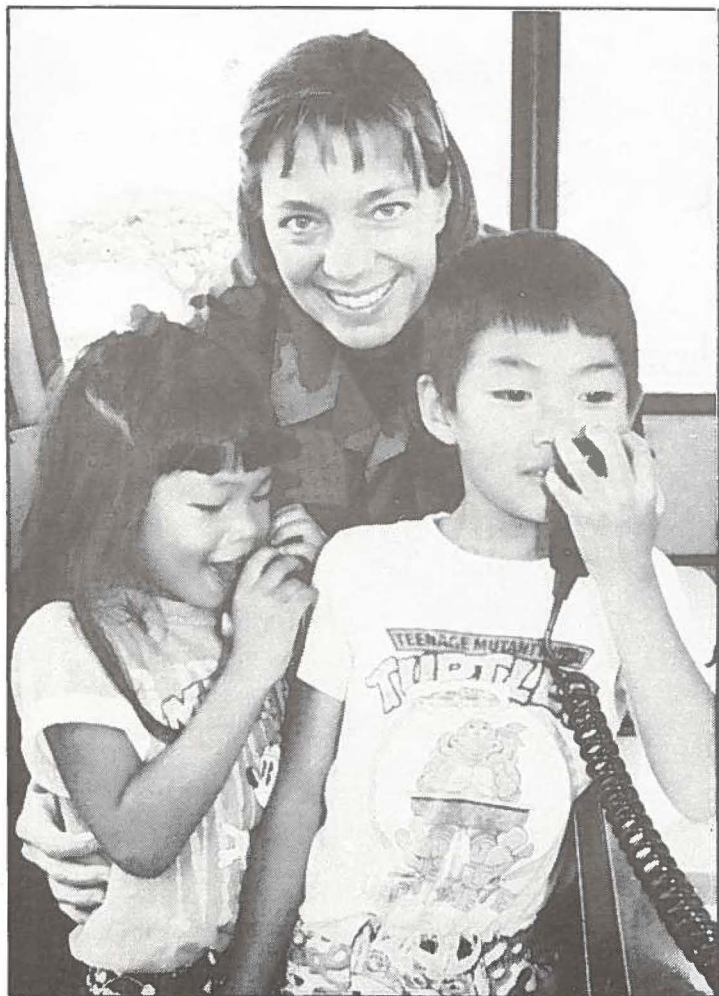

On April 7, 1993, the House of Representatives of the Hawaii State Legislature honored leaders of the Hawaii National Guard, State Civil Defense, and the active Army for the assistance given to the people of Kauai following Hurricane Iniki. House Resolutions were presented to each leader. The resolution to the Hawaii Army National Guard reads, in part:

"WHEREAS, on the afternoon of September 11, 1992, the eye of the most destructive storm ever to hit the Hawaiian Islands passed directly over the Island of Kauai, bringing rain and winds in excess of 100 miles per hour across the Garden Isle; and

"WHEREAS, the destructive wrath of Hurricane Iniki se-

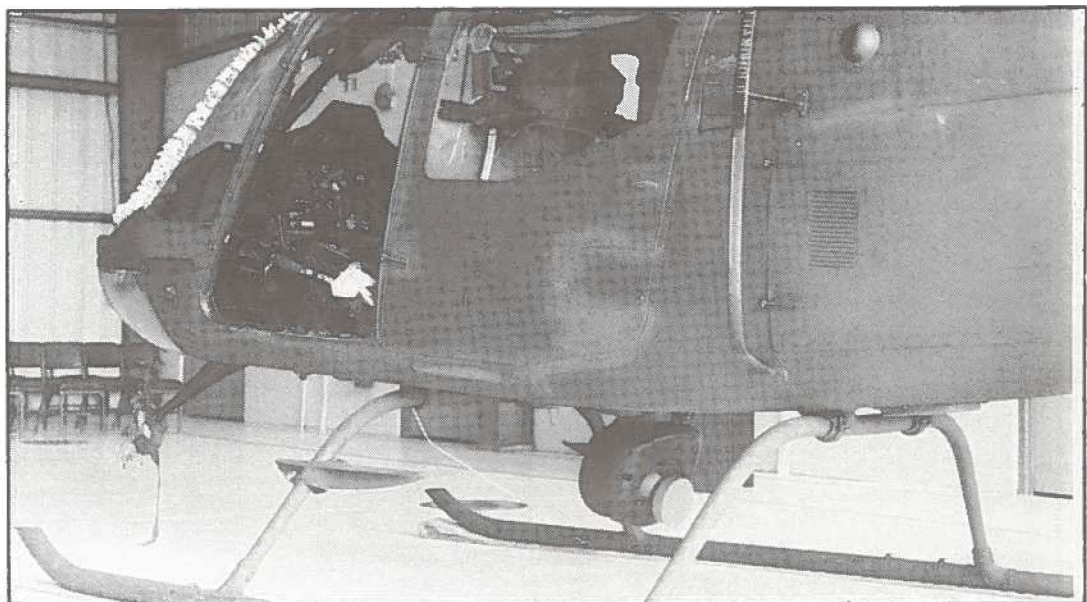
verely damaged Kauai's utility infrastructure) particularly water, sewer, electric, and telecommunication), jeopardized the welfare and safety of citizens, and created an urgent need for humanitarian aid on the Island of Kauai; and

"WHEREAS, activated upon the issuance of a hurricane warning by the National Weather service on September 10th, the HAWAII NATIONAL GUARD mobilized in the hours that followed Hurricane Iniki to provide immediate assistance to the people of Kauai; and

"WHEREAS, in the following weeks, by consolidating the efforts of 5,500 troops from Hawaii, and personnel from National Guard units from California, Washington, Oregon, Oklahoma, Alaska, Texas, and Tennessee, the HAWAII NATIONAL GUARD worked around the clock to return normalcy to devastated areas; and

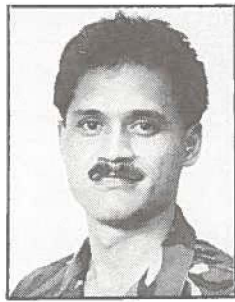

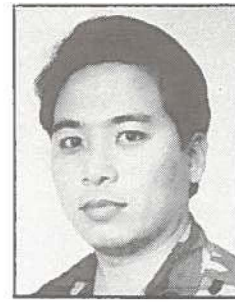

# Play it safe -- use basic rules for hand tools

Almost all of us use hand tools at work and at home. It is estimated that about eight percent of industrial accidents involve the unsafe use of hand tools (both manual and power).

These accidents often result from using the wrong tool for the job (or using the right tool incorrectly), failing to wear personal protective equipment, or failing to fol-

low approved safety guidelines.

The following checklist provides some basic rules for the safe use of hand tools. Take a moment to review this list, and use the tips here whenever you use a hand tool -- on or off the job.

- Know the purpose of each tool in your toolbox, and use each for the specific task it was designed to do.
- Never use any tool -- hand or power -- unless you

are trained to do so.

- Inspect tools before each use and replace or repair it if it is worn or damaged.
- Clean tools after each use.
- Keep cutting edges sharp.
- Never test a cutting edge with your fingers. Test it on scrap material instead.
- Select the right tool for the job. Don't use cheaters.
- When working on ladders or scaffolding, be sure that you and your tools are secure. A falling tool can

seriously injure a coworker or bystander.

- Carry tools correctly. Never put sharp or pointed tools in your pockets.

- When hand-carrying tools, point cutting edges away from you, toward the ground.
- Lightly oil metal tools and store in a clean, dry place

to prevent rust.

- Wear personal protective equipment, such as safety goggles, face shields, gloves, etc. as required.
