Allied operational missions take Hawaii Air National Guard to Balkans, Persian Gulf

Hawaii Air National Guard (HIANG) personnel have been deploying to several far-flung places of the world, mostly with little fanfare, as they participate in Aerospace Expeditionary Forces nine and ten. As part of AEF 10, 204th Airlift Squadron flight crews and maintenance personnel from the 154th Aircraft Generation Squadron have deployed to Germany; 154th Security Force Squadron personnel have gone to Incirlik Air Base, Turkey; videographers from the 154th Communications Flight have practiced their skills while at Aviano Air Base, Italy; and, a forecaster from the 199th Weather Flight helped provide weather reports to flyers at Incirlik.

"We provided entry control and close boundary security for aircraft on the flightline as well as mobile patrols," said Staff Sgt. Dulcie Hale, one of 26 members of the Hawaii security force who deployed to Turkey between Oct. 22 and Nov. 17. "Everything was exactly the

same compared with the active-duty. We were treated very well by active (Air Force) personnel, and we worked sideby-side with security forces from Lackland and Nellis," said Hale, who had prior service with the active-duty Air Force before joining the Hawaii Guard.

Allied aircraft have been flying patrols over the northern no-fly zone of Iraq as part of Operation NORTHERN

Operation HO'ALA (restore)

Big Island Guard soldiers from Company B, 2nd Battalion, 299th Infantry were called into action to conduct a cleanup of debris in Waiakea Uka, Hawaii, after rains caused ma-

Civilian educational program updated

Been thinking about a college degree? Now, more than ever, the Guard can help you achieve that goal. The educational benefits that Hawaii National Guard members can draw their college degree. It's a tremendous benefit for our Army Guard members and can also be an important selling tool in recruiting others into the Hawaii National Guard.

If you are attending a private college, then the National Guard Bureau is also available through the Montgomery GI Bill – Selected Reserve (MGIB-SR), Chapter 1606. The basic monthly assistance for full-time college attendance is \$263 per month. This amount is prorated for part-time college attendance. This program is Internet or through the DANTES distance learning program.

For enlisted soldiers, you can also take advantage of the Student Loan Repayment Program. This is an enlistment option and benefits for nonprior service enlistees in any military occupational skill (MOS). To receive the benefit you must have existing student loans at the time you enlist or reenlist for six years. You can receive up to \$10,000 plus interest to help pay back any college education loans. See your unit representative for further details and qualifications. In the Hawaii National Guard, education really pays. Learn more about these many educational benefits by calling your Unit Readiness NCO and the Educational Services Officer, Maj. upon provides a good headstart toward funding your college degree. As a member of the Hawaii Guard, college is certainly within reach.

The Hawaii Guard State Tuition Assistance Program or TAP, as it is commonly known, provides 100 percent tuition assistance at any University of Hawaii community college. If you are attending a four-year University of Hawaii college, such as UH Manoa, UH West Oahu, or UH Hilo, you can apply for 50 percent tuition assistance. Currently, this program is helping over 520 Army Guard members achieve

(NGB) tuition assistance program can help. This program provides 75 percent tuition assistance, not to exceed \$100 per semester hour (sh), for undergraduate and \$170 per semester hour for graduate degrees, up to 15 semester hours per year.

The NGB TAP can also be used with the State TAP if you are receiving 50 percent tuition assistance at UH Manoa, UH West Oahu, or UH Hilo. Using both the NGB and State TAP programs will cover approximately 75 percent of the total tuition cost.

In addition to the State TAP program, assistance

further sweetened by the MGIB-SR "kicker." The Kicker provides an additional \$200 per month. Check with your unit representative to determine if you are eligible for MGIB-SR benefits. They can also inform you if you qualify for the "kicker."

Here, you'll be able to get useful information on the many programs that allow you to earn a degree without classroom instruction. 

From court to cockpit

Itoman is a young woman who needs to challenge herself. She has been driven to excel for almost as long as she can remember. Now the former University of Hawaii Na Wahine basketball standout is taking on, perhaps, the biggest challenge of her life, as pilot trainee for the Hawaii Air National Guard. Itoman, a 1999 UH graduate, has been selected to become a C-130 Hercules pilot with the 204th Airlift Squadron at Hickam Air Force Base. BJ Itoman is very well known locally for her exploits as a member of the Wahine team from 1995-1999, but she wasn't entirely sure what she wanted to do after graduation. A shot with the Womens National Basketball Association did not work out, and she considered working in the field of physical therapy, before deciding against it. But then, her brother, 1st Lt.

Rvan Itoman, an F-15 Eagle fighter pilot with the 199th Fighter Squadron, kept touting the benefits and excitement of flying. That was it-she set her sights on becoming a pilot with the HIANG. "I can see that there are similarities between sports and the military-the discipline, and working as a team," said BJ. "My brother exposed me to the challenges of aviation. I decided that's what I wanted to do as well," she added. "She has all the qualities that make a good pilot-she's smart, determined and tough," said Ryan. Although Ryan has faith in his sister's abilities, he's taking measures to improve her chances of succeeding while at UPT (undergraduate pilot training) by helping her study at home and encouraging her to get her private pilot's license. Once BJ is commissioned and completes pilot training, Hawaii will be the only state in the country to have a brother and sister who are Air National Guard pilots.

"Computers for School Program" gets boost from communications flight

A handful of computer technicians from the 154th Communication Flight, part of the 154th Support Group, are handling virtually the entire "Computers for Schools Program" within the State. Since January 1999, the Communications Flight has provided more than 300 surplus computers to 39 different schools in Hawaii. Another 68 computers, most of them Gateway 133's with first generation Pentium processors, are currently being prepped for delivery to eight more local schools in late January 2001. Hawaii Air National Guard personnel volunteer their time for the program, working after hours or on weekends.

Volunteers make sure computers are functional

Staff Sgt. Shannon Ferreira first started using computers when she was in intermediate school on Maui. Now, she is the unit's team leader, helping the next generation of Hawaii's school students acquire computer skills. "There is a lot of hard work involved. It was especially tough when we first started the program," said Ferreira. "I was putting in an extra full Saturday each month and a lot of extra hours after work in order to get the computers ready for delivery; but when you see the positive reactions and smiles from the students and teachers, it makes it all worthwhile." Ferreira still volunteers an extra hour almost every day toward the Computers for Schools Program. Senior Airman Neil Fujinaga and Senior Airman Valerie Fortin are also members of the Comput-

ers for Schools team, under the supervision of Capt. Marcus Badley, flight commander. It was Badley who recommended to the unit that they make the Computers for Schools Program their ongoing community service project. "We service computers as part of our mission. There is a great need for computers in our schools. Making **Computers for Schools** our community service project was a natural fit," said Badley.

Before a computer leaves the Communications Flight, the HIANG airmen make sure the computer is in working order. If it's not, they may cannibalize parts from another computer to fix the problem, and, because the computers were once used by the HIANG, a military organization, the hard drives must be

"sanitized." Occasionally, the unit will even trouble shoot problems with the school's computers, which involves picking up the computer, fixing the problem, then returning it to the school.

Donations to schools meet with **Presidential Executive Order** guidelines

The Hawaii Air National Guard has been assisting Hawaii's school children learn computer skills with the donated equipment under provisions of President **Clinton's Executive Or**der 12999, signed in April 1996. The Defense Information Systems Agency at the Gunter Annex, Maxwell Air Force Base, authorizes the transfer of the computers from the HIANG to the Department of Education.

The 204th Airlift Squadron deployed to Ramstein Air Base, Germany and flew resupply missions for the NATO peacekeeping operation in the Balkans. "Our crews flew missions that took us through towering mountain peaks of the Alps and into fog shrouded valleys of Sarajevo and Tuzla, Bosnia-Herzegovina and Skopje, Macedonia, to name a few," said Chief Master Sgt. Sam Wong, 204th chief loadmaster. "Every aspect of the operation allowed aircrews and maintainers alike, the opportunity to integrate with our active duty counterparts, as well as with crews from the Alaska and West Virginia ANG C-130 units," said Wong. All missions were flown on time and no cancellations were experienced due to maintenance. Maintenance and life support staff worked 12-hour shifts to ensure that the aircraft was always ready for the next mission. "Working with maintenance

personnel

from other units proved to be a unique learning experience," said Staff Sgt. Paul Kalama. "We were able to exchange processes and ideas in our maintenance functions, which allowed us to function as a team."

The largest and most visible deployment for AEF 9 involved approximately 250 members of the 199th Fighter Squadron, 154th Maintenance Squadron and 154th Aircraft Generation Squadron who deployed to the Persian Gulf region around Thanksgiving with a scheduled return date of Dec. 14. F-15 pilots from the 199th are currently providing defense for coalition aircraft enforcing the southern no-fly zone of Iraq, as part of Operation SOUTHERN WATCH. "This operation is helping to keep Saddam Hussein in check. Saddam Hussein is an angry and frustrated man because he has tried to shoot down a coalition flyer for the past ten

years, but he has not been able to," said Maj. Rojo Johnson, a 199th fighter pilot. "We're going to do everything can we to ensure that all of our people come back safely," added Johnson, who led the main body of airmen who departed Hickam Air Force Base on Nov. 24. "Our maintenance folks have been doing an outstanding job keeping our jets flying and the required maintenance work completed on time," said Lt. Col. James "Bat" Drake, the detachment commander. "We have been filling all our taskings plus getting in a few training sorties here than there when the mission allows the break." said Drake.

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

Cultural, environmental sensitivities play role in logo design, office motto

In July 2000, the Hawaii Army National Guard Environmental Office commissioned local artist Nicholas Black to design a logo for the environmental program that was as unique as the program itself. Using information provided by the environmental staff, Black combined the elements of strength and stewardship by embodying the spirit of the program in a decorated and adorned warrior figure. In the design, he brandishes the spear - a simple but effective tool and one of many that helps him protect the land he surveys. In the foreground, representing our natural resources is the endangered 'ohai, a rare Hawaiian plant located at Kanaio Training Area, Maui. Above the plant are Hawaiian petroglyphs representing our stewardship of the many cultural resources found on HIARNG training lands. In the background and in the view of our warrior is an ancient stone emplacement representing our Guard facilities, statewide. Diamond Head Crater resides in the far background symbolizing the high level of visibility that all efforts at preserving our environment has in the state of Hawaii.

waii County Civil Defense in disaster relief. The Guard's mission included over 100 truck loads of debris. Living rooms, driveways, and streets were cleared of natural debris, and, household items that were damaged by the torrential rainfall. The 120 Big Island soldiers loaded 55 5-ton trucks of debris in Hilo alone.

Hawaii County Civil Defense Administrator, Bill Davis, expressed his thanks for a job well done. "We certainly appreciate all the efforts that have been done not only by the state, but by the Guard," Davis said.

The cleanup started during the November drill weekend and carried over to the next couple of days. During the weekend, more than 100 soldiers participated in the relief operation and during the week, they had over 40 soldiers a day volunteering for duty.

Spc. Tobey Duldulao of Company B, summarized the feelings of all the Guard members participating, "It's good to help the community in a disaster like this."


In the Kawailani area of Waiakea Uka, Lawrence and Sharon Moyer share an opinion of the relief efforts provided by the Hawaii Army National Guard, "They are fantastic!" The Moyers experienced first hand the destructive and devastating power of this most recent flood. This is their third flood since 1979, this time they have insurance, but it still caught them by surprise. "By 1:00 in the morning, the water was door knob high, finally it broke through the jalousies and washed through the house," explained Mr. Møyer. Their backyard is now covered with three feet of mud, rock, street and other debris from the neighborhood. The road that borders their backyard collapsed all the way to the center line. Guard members spent a lot of time on the Moyer residence. The driveway needed to be shoveled clean, and a couple of truck loads were filled from this house alone. It didn't go unnoticed.

up duties. A UH-60 Blackhawk was employed to fly FEMA representatives over the flood damaged area. Fifteen tourists were stranded in the Wood Valley area of the Big Island held up in a temple. The Guard used two twoand-a-half ton trucks to evacuate the group and brought them back to Hilo. Once the group reached civilization, they expressed relief.

Fire safety

Fire Station 6 had already responded to Sam Kukui's house as he arrived home that afternoon. Fierce heat and flames radiated to the adjacent

residential dwellings. Fire quickly swept from the first floor kitchen to the second level, destroying most of their home while threatening other residences. Fire moved quickly into the ground floor den where Sam kept his steel guitar and koa wood ukuleles. These were valuable treasures that were passed down by his father's, father. Sam Kukui never thought a fire would break out at his home. "I was careful. I didn't even let anyone smoke at my house," he says. Now, Sam realizes that he didn't do all that he could have to keep his family and their property safe. Like Sam, many people don't think enough about fire safety. Some 4,000 Americans die in fires, and \$4 billion worth of residential property is damaged annually. About 370,000 homes are fire scenes each year, and about 80 percent of deaths from fire occur in homes, according to the National Fire Protection Association. An overwhelming number of the victims are children and the elderly.

Fraining Schedule

Hot Tips for Fire Safety

 Install smoke alarms on every level of your home so that family members can hear them wherever they are.

- Never disconnect smoke alarms or borrow the batteries.
- Create a home escape plan. Practice it.
- Never smoke in bed or when drowsy.
- Wear clothes with short or snug sleeves while cooking so that they won't catch fire.
- Keep matches and lighters up high, well away from children.

• Keep combustible materials, such as kitchen towels and newspapers, away from heat source, such as candles, burners and portable heaters.

• Have professionals check the fireplace and furnace annually, and clean if necessary.

Don't overload electrical circuits.

• In case of fire, leave your home immediately. Don't try to save anything. Call the fire department from a neighbor's house.

Did You Know?

Smoke alarms won't last forever. Replace them every 10 years.
