

29th parades at Schofield tomorrow

Family members and friends of 29th Brigade personnel will head for Schofield Barracks tomorrow to watch the troop march at Lightning Field as a highlight of Armed Forces Day.

The parade is scheduled for 10 a.m. and is tied in with the brigade's first anniversary of service.

It was called up from National Guard status on May 13, 1968. There are several good attractions for children at Schofield.

THE CHILDREN CAN jump from a tower and make believe they are in airborne training.

There is a mini-train to ride through the woods near Lightning Field.

Each youngster can be a mini-MP and get his own identification card with his fingerprint on it.

For the adults, there is a new weapon, the Sheridan M-551 armored reconnaissance vehicle, and other equipment on display.

THOSE motorists going over Kolekole Pass (open 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.) might like to stop at the 25th Division Museum and look at North Vietnam and Viet Cong weapons, mostly made in Russia and Red China.

There will be demonstrations of air power at Wheeler, and the gates of Pearl Harbor, Hickam and the Kaneohe Marine base will be open most of the day.

The Coast Guard will have two ships open for inspection at Honolulu Harbor's Pier 4 while the Navy will have ships at Pearl Harbor.

THE JOSEPH Strauss will replace the McMorris as an open house ship when Pearl Harbor opens its gates to the public tomorrow from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Visitors (including those whose cars have base decals) must use the Halawa Gate.

Two other ships—the Grapple and the Carbonero, will be open to visitors as previously announced.

The guided missile destroyer Strauss, commissioned in 1963, carries the Tartar-guided missile ~~weapons~~ system and anti-submarine torpedoes.
