13, the date Hawaii Guardsmen and Reservists must report for active duty. All enlisted men who have not had physical checkups since last May are being processed.

Guardsmen Checklist Listed

National Guard headquarters on the Big Island today reminded all members to be sure to have the necessary documents required for members with dependents who have been called to active duty. The list includes:

1. Birth certificate of Guard member.
2. Marriage certificate.
3. Birth certificate of each dependent.
4. Certified court adoption papers for adopted children 21 years of age or younger.
5. If previously married, divorce papers or death certificate.

Trade In Your 'C' For A 'V', Legal Officer Tells Guardsmen

HONOLULU (AP)—The legal officer of the Hawaii National Guard, James Burns, told State employees who were called to active duty to "tighten your belts."

Speaking to Hawaii National Guardsmen and Army Reservists who face up to two years of active duty under the recent call-up, Burns said, "if your income has been material-

ly reduced, trade in your Cadillac for a Volkswagen."

Ernest M. S. Loo of the Department of Personnel Services told the men, meeting on the Iolani Palace grounds, they will be able to return to their State jobs if they show up within 90 days after they get out of military duty.

Kim Tet Lee of the State Employees' Retirement System told them not to resign from

their State jobs before entering military service because they would lose many benefits.

Some have considered resigning to get money they have contributed to the state retirement system.

Burns said they could get some relief from the soldiers and sailors' civil relief act, but advised it is not a cure-all.

Gen. Takemoto To Retire

HONOLULU (AP) — A spokesman for the Hawaii National Guard said Brigadier General Francis S. Takemoto won't take command of the 29th Brigade when it reports to active duty at Schofield Barracks May 13.

The spokesman said Takemoto, principal of Manoa Elementary School, will retire instead. Takemoto had planned to re-

tire in November after about 33 years as a commissioned officer. No replacement was announced for Takemoto.

Listed

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1. Birth certificate of Guard member.
2. Marriage certificate.
3. Birth certificate of each dependent.
4. Certified court adoption papers for adopted children 21 years of age or younger.
5. If previously married, divorce papers or death certificate terminating the previous marriage.
6. Statement from duly licensed physician or medical officer indicating that dependent children over 21 years of age mentally or physically incapacitated are incapable of self-support, and period of such incapacity.
7. Have information as to the exact name and location of any private school, college, or university where a dependent age 22 or younger is enrolled in a full-time course of study.

As many of these documents as are available should be brought to the next drill (May 4-5) if the Guardsmen failed to come up with the necessary documents by last weekend's drill, a Guard spokesman said.
