Capitol Square Is Scene of Great Militia Fete

TEN companies of the First Infantry, national guard, assisted by the engineer company, turned out more than eight hundred men yesterday morning, the elimination trials for the big annual Kamehameha Day tournament and the showing that they made would not have disgraced many regiments of the regular army. Certainly no militia troops on the mainland would have any cause to congratulate themselves on their own superiority in drill, in promptness or in enthusiasm for their work, over Hawaii's national guard.

The standing of the companies after the tournament, according to the official score kept by regular army officers who acted as judges, put Company K, the Kamehameha company, Captain McCandless in the lead with a percentage of eighty-five. Company M, the Filipinos, Captain Hampton, came next with eighty-three per cent, followed closely by Company F, with seventy-nine per cent and Company A with seventy-eight per cent; Company G followed with seventy-five and Company E with seventy-four per cent. Company D was given fifty-nine, I won sixty-seven, H seventy and Company B was last, with fifty-one per cent. These figures are inclusive of the results of the wall-scaling contests and the shoe
