

GENERAL JOHNSON PLANS BIG TIMES KAMEHAMEHA DAY

Holiday Doings Will Start To-
morrow Afternoon With Great
Game of Polo

FOUR SCORE GUESTS ARE
INVITED TO PLAY PARTY

Finals In National Guard Military
Tournament To Be Run
Off Sunday

Provided the plans of Brig.-Gen. Samuel I. Johnson meet no interference in the form of a 75-centimetre gun, a highly improbable supposition, the visit of the Third Regiment of Maui polo team to Honolulu for the events of Saturday and Monday next will be an incident long to be remembered. General Johnson is working just about as hard and effectively for this affair as he did to bring the personnel of the guard from about 600 to more than 5000 within a brief six months, and it is already conceded that his efforts will meet with a like success.

As a starter it is fully anticipated around national guard headquarters that the N. G. H. team will win a victory in Saturday's match. However, figuring the reverse to be the case there will be no change in plans and Saturday will be "Polo Day" for all guardsmen, and Saturday night will be "Polo Night" for the same persons.

The adjutant-general has requested every automobile owner and driver in Honolulu to get busy and decorate his or her car, or cars, with the national guard colors, orange and black. It is expected that ribbons of the same color will be worn and that banners will be carried to the polo field and also to the big night event at the Bijou Theater.

Lytell Will Contribute

At the Bijou the general has arranged with Bert Lytell for something special in the way of a performance and it is expected that every guard officer in Honolulu, with wife or sweetheart, or wife and sweetheart will be present, in white. To this end arrangements have been made with the management of the theater to set aside a large portion of the house for guard use. It is specially requested by General Johnson that officers secure their reservations immediately in order that they may be assured accommodations and also make a big showing for the guard.

Among the guests of General Johnson on Saturday night will be Governor Pinkham, General and Mrs. Evans, General and Mrs. Strong, Dr. C. B. Cooper, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Rice, Harold Rice and family, Jimmie Spaulding and wife, W. F. Dillingham and wife, Harold Dillingham and wife, R. W. Shingle and wife, Walter Macfarlane and wife, the members of the guard and the army polo team, their ladies and a number of others, to a total of eighty.

For Sunday the program includes the final tournament of the various companies of the First Regiment, for which a number of valuable cups have been offered. This affair will take place at Athletic Park at nine-thirty a. m., and it is expected that Honoluluans will turn out in large numbers and see what six months' training has done for several hundred raw recruits. There is promised considerable of a surprise in the efficient manner in which the competing companies will handle themselves on this occasion. The public is requested to turn out on this occasion and show its appreciation for the hard licks that have been put in by the guardsmen through this medium.

Details of Program

The program is as follows:

Competitive Drill: Given by five companies of the 1st Infantry, N. G. H., that were successful in the elimination competition held May 14. In the preliminaries, the two best companies in each battalion were selected to compete in the finals. Company D, winner of second place in the 1st Battalion, on May 14, has withdrawn, leaving the following companies to compete in the finals, in the order named:

Company A. Capt. Henry P. O'Sullivan; 1st Lieut. Harold Godfrey; 2d Lieut. Thomas J. K. Evans. This Com-

Company F. Capt. Edward Hopkins; 1st Lieut. Mark Houghtailing; 2d Lieut. James Lemon. Company F is one of the old-established companies of the Guard, and has won a number of Military Tournaments and Competitive Drills. In 1903, commanded by Capt. Samuel I. Johnson secured a percentage of 99.3 in competitive drill.

Company G. Capt. Louis K. Kane; 2d Lieut. Wm. G. Kaina. A Hawaiian Company of long standing. The men are recruited principally from among the longshoremen and stevedores of the local waterfront.

Company K. Capt. John McCandless; 1st Lieut. Fred K. Ellis; 2d Lieut. John Vanatta. A recently-organized company, composed entirely of graduates of Kamthameha School. This Company received the highest percentage in the regiment, at the preliminary trials on May 14.

Company M. Capt. Wm. J. Hampton; 1st Lieut. Sherwood M. Lowrey; 2d Lieut. H. Stuart Johnson. All Filipinos. This Company was organized last fall by Gen. Johnson. Many of the men are former soldiers of the Scouts and Philippine Constabulary. Company M took second place in the regiment in the elimination competition.

ORDER OF EVENTS

The list of events of the final tournament, together with the value of each event, is as follows: Close order, 35; extended order, 30; bayonet exercise, 10; attendance, 20; wall scaling 5, (2d place 4, 3d 3, 4th 2, 5th 1.).

The following movements will be required in close and extended order, to be executed in the order given:

CLOSE ORDER

1. Manual of arms. Ten movements.
2. Being in line, from column of squads to the right.
3. Being in column of squads, form line to the right.
6. Being in line execute platoons left by squads.
5. Being in line of platoons; platoons left front into line; execute in place halt during execution of the movement and then complete formation.
6. Being in line execute platoons right.
7. Being in column of platoons, execute on left into line.
8. Being in line, form column of squads and change direction. (Squads right column right.)
9. Being in column of squads, execute left front into line.
10. Being in line, execute to the rear; by the right flank; to the rear; by the left flank.
11. Being in line, to change direction to the right.
12. Being in line, turn company on a fixed pivot to the left.
13. Being in line, right oblique and halt.
14. Move to position in front of, and facing grandstand and take distance.

15. Bayonet exercise, three minutes. EXTENDED ORDER

1. Being in column of squads, form skirmish line to the front, with guide right.
2. Being in skirmish line, assemble the company.
4. Being in line, form skirmish line to the front.
4. Being in skirmish line, form squad columns.
5. Being in squad columns, form skirmish line.
6. Being in skirmish line, form platoon columns.
7. Being in platoon columns, form skirmish line.
8. Assemble and march to point on drill ground furthest removed from grandstand, and facing grandstand, company in line.
9. Form skirmish line, guide center.
10. Being in skirmish line, in attack: Fire at will, targets assumed at 800 yards directly in front of company. Company gains fire superiority. Advance by rushes (1) platoons, (2) squads, (3) individuals, (4) charge, (5) assemble.
