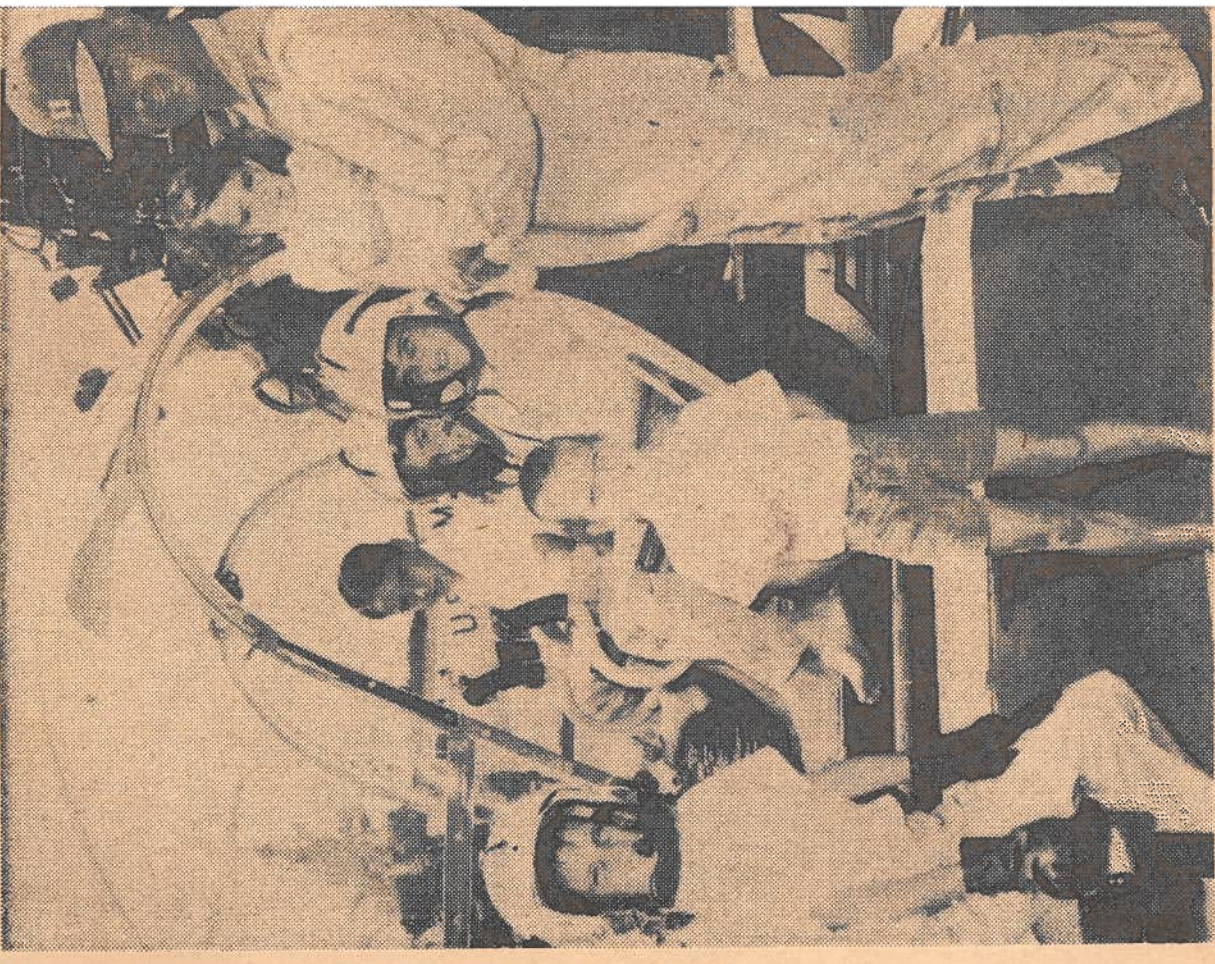

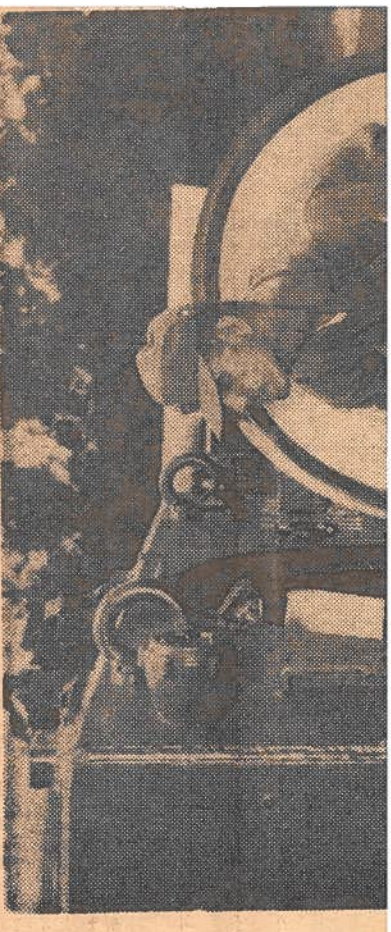
# A Father's Day Salute to Soldier Dads

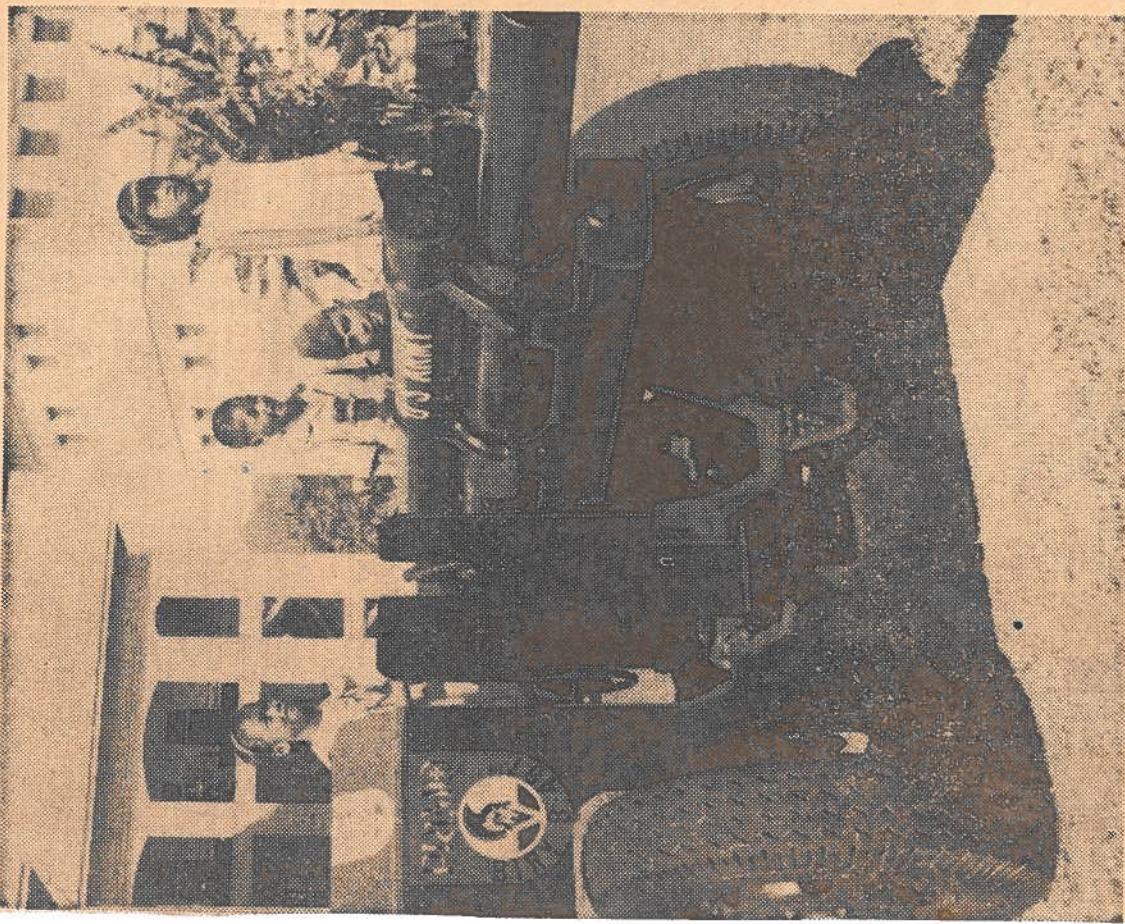

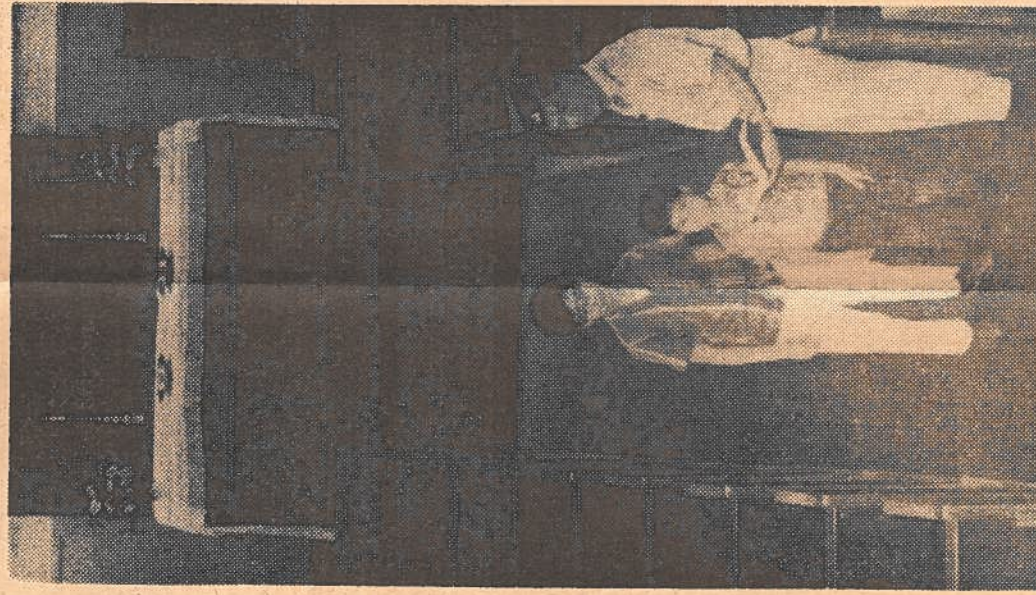
