NATIONAL GUARD NOTES

Through the Maui Chamber of Commerce, Sgt. August Wetzel, U. S. A., detailed as inspector-instructor to the National Guard companies on Maui, has been given, for use in visiting the companies on the island, an Overland car. Sgt. Wetzel found it impossible to attend the drills of the six companies on the island without a car and the Chamber of Commerce at once procured one for his use.

More than 300 couples attended the New Years dance and entertainment given in the Wailuku armory by the troops of National Guard on Maui. The event was pronounced a big success. W. H. Hutton of the Honolulu detective force was one of the entertainers, telling a story or two and singing some songs. Hutton is greatly pleased with the hospitality shown him by the people on Maui.

Forty members for a company of the Signal Corps, National Guard of Hawaii, have already signified their intention of enlisting in the new company which is being formed here by R. L. Noggle. Mr. Noggle has served in the United States Volunteers, and is familiar with signal work.

Capt. Frank Baldwin of Puunene, Maui, has donated to the National Guard there 58 acres of land between Kahului and Wailuku for use as a camping ground and target range. The piece of land is large enough for a 1000 yard range and can be used by a whole regiment for drills and firing. It is close to the headquarters of two of the companies on Maui. Prisoners are now digging pits for targets on the range.
