

NO ATTEMPT TO ORGANIZE NEW OAHU REGIMENT

s General Johnson Says This Isl-
and Has Not Responded as
Well as Other Three

r- Brigadier-General Samuel I. John-
or son, will make no attempt to organize
of another regiment of the National
d Guard of Hawaii on Oahu until all the
s troops here and on the other islands
a are fully equipped, and unless enlist-
s ments come in more rapidly it is prob-
or able he will not then attempt to form
another full regiment.

e Oahu has not responded to the call
e for volunteers as well, in proportion
e to population, as the other islands, and
e there is some doubt whether another
e regiment could be formed here.

e The 1st Regiment, N. G. H., sta-
e tioned on Oahu, is recruited about up
e to full strength, and there are with it
e a hospital and signal corps, while the
e 1st Separate Company, Engineers, un-
e der command of Capt. Charles R.
e Forbes, also has headquarters in Ho-
e nolulu. But with all these, Oahu will
e have "nothing on the other islands,"
e each of which will have a full regi-
e ment and attached companies as soon
e as the troops can be mustered in and
e the officers commissioned and pre-
e pared for their work.

l Where the Naval Militia will belong
l after it is fully organized and recog-
l nized by the department at Washing-
l ton is a question which is to be set-
l tled, as there seems some doubt
l whether it will exist separately or will
l come under control of the adjutan-
l general of the Territory of Hawai.
l The Naval Militia now musters about
l 50 members, and its full complement
l in order to man a ship, will have to
l be about 125.
